
CURRICULUM

- All courses are taught at an advanced (Honors) level.
- Friends School of Baltimore does not designate any course Advanced Placement (AP).
- Friends School of Baltimore does not calculate class rank.
- All GPAs are **unweighted** and **include only academic course work** taken at Friends. Physical education, fine/performing arts, and most non-departmental electives are not factored into the GPA.
- Some students, by virtue of their placement as incoming ninth graders, are unable to advance to the highest-level courses in mathematics, science, and foreign language.
- Friends School of Baltimore is on a semester schedule. One-credit courses meet four times in a 6-day cycle for two semesters. Half-credit courses meet four times in a 6-day cycle for one semester.
- . **COVID-19 Updates**: Distance learning began mid-March 2020. Friends successfully shifted fully remote and a numerical grade was given in all academic classes. Fall 2020 was all virtual until October 13 with a streamlined schedule of courses meeting 2x/week. Students chose to return to a hybrid schedule or remain virtual in October. **By May 2021, 95% of students were on campus for 4 day/week in-person.** Traditional grading rubrics were applied to all 2020-2021 courses.




